Indians Ambush East Haven 20-18

Memorial Field Proves To Be 'Burial Ground'

Center Memorial Field in North Haven, site of North Haven High School's home football games, is supposed to be abandoned by the Indians next season in favor of a newly seeded gridiron behind the school. But the place will still live rather vividly in the minds of the Indians' Housatonic League rivals. They'll remember it as the graveyard of potential champions.

Yesterday morning, before a Veterans' Day crowd of approximately 1,000, Tom Gould's unheralded Indians played the role of spoiler again by riding from a 12-0 first-quarter deficit for a stirring 20-18 triumph over second-place East Haven that just about removed the Easties from the title running. And it was on the same sod, almost exactly a month before, that the Indians had knocked Branford from among the underdogs in a 22-20 ambush.

The deciding touchdown in yesterday's game — which dropped East Haven from second to third and left Shelton the undisputed leader by a half-game over Branford — came on an 18-yard pass from quarterback Dave Gould to fullback Arthur Bodwell with just five minutes remaining. East Haven gained two more scoring chances after that, but Nate Menchetti recovered a ball pried loose from Yellowjacket Jim Salvati on the Tribe 32 with four minutes to go, and in the final play the Easties' Vin Virgilio was pulled down at the 32 on an unsuccessful attempt to penetrate the Indians' tight line.

Offensive honors in the game were divided between Menchetti, a fighting fullback who gained 49 yards in 15 rushes and placekicked both the extra points, and Gould, who completed six of 14 passes for 130 yards and made two for them his ninth and 10 touchdowns. Losses of the year. His first of the morning was a 26-yard throw on the opening play of the second period, which right end Mike Melody intercepted on the Eastie 45 and carried the rest of the way on a 72-yard play. That tally, with Menchetti's conversion, brought the Indians from virtual oblivion and cut the Eastie edge to only 12-2.

Easties Start Fast
East Haven started out to make a thing of it, scored twice in the opening session while North Haven was making only 12 yards. But Vetrone made the first TD on a 10-yard jump pass from quarterback Nick Napolitano after getting in

with a fumble recovery on the 10 and Salvati carried around it and for the second effort Vetrone had picked up a huddle as Indians 12 on the preceding play. Vetrone actually made good on the Easties' first yard and the point, and a pass by Letts from the 7 was batted down. Vetrone's boot after the previous TD had been blocked, and in the third stanza, after the Easties had captured the lead at 18-12, Vetrone kicked low and wide.

Gould Passes Click
Gould's scoring pitch to Melody came on the second play after the ensuing kickoff, which Nate Gould had returned to the Indian 22. Midway through the period the Redskins struck again, gaining 45 yards in five plays with Menchetti barging over from the two after Gould had pegged to Johnny Roche for 22 to put it there. Menchetti's kick was blocked after a high pass from center but the Tribe went off with a 13-12 margin at the half, after a possible third TD drive fizzled at the Eastie 12.

East Haven woke up after intermission and moved the kickoff 40 yards in 12 plays with the longest gain a 25-yard strike from Letts to left end Ernie Monaco. An interference call gave the Easties 481 down on the one and after the Indians braved the 100 yards, Salvati punted over.

The Indians raged back to the Eastie 37, but ran out of steam there when Menchetti was collared on fourth down a yard short of a first. Shortly afterwards, however, the Tribe got possession again and began its winning push from their own 29. A line of 16 and four yards by Monetti moved them to the 22, 140 — on a third down there, Gould's 7 to Roche, who took it 14-19, 7 to Letts and raced 35 yards to the Eastie 18. From there, Gould, from double-wing formation, hit Bodwell with a toss over the middle of the line, and Bodwell outpaced Letts and Vin Virgilio to the 10, a coffin corner for the visitors.

"We knew they were going to pass. So we worked on it every day."
"However, when the time came to put our lessons into action we fell flat on our faces. That Mike Melody managed to get behind two of our defenders for their first score, and that's all they needed."

"After that they were up, and we were down. We didn't deserve to win. Neither the game, or the Housatonic League pennant."

"And that's the first time I've ever said that out an East-Haven team," said Frank.

Indians Trip Branford, 62-57, For First Victory In Series

Branford High, upset victor over powerful East Haven last Friday night, moved into North Haven last night and was ambushed by the Indians for the first time in the schools' brief Housatonic League series, 62-57.

The Indians, sparked by the fast-breaking of co-captain Johnny Roche and the rebounding of Al Hadley, tallied nine straight points at the beginning of the second half to erase a Branford lead, then put down a last-minute Hornet rally to secure their fifth victory in ten decisions. The loss was Branford's third against two wins.

The first half was fairly even, with North Haven enjoying a brief lead only to have Branford tie it 12-12 at the quarter and go one up, 21-20, at the half. In the third quarter, however, the Indians built up a 29-21 lead before the visitors knew what hit them, and the Tribes continued to lead, going into the last quarter, 48-35. The Hornets, led by center Pete Dzwonkowski, put on a determined rally to pull within a bucket, 57-55, with two minutes left in the game, but Don Strader increased the North Haven margin to three points with a foul shot. Hadley put in a rebound, and Hank Sargent followed with a lay-up to put the game on ice.

The story of the game is found in the team shooting. North Haven hit for 34.8 per cent of its shots from the floor.

North Haven High snapped a 6-6 tie with a pair of touchdowns in the third period and went on to trounce Seymour, 25-12, yesterday in a Housatonic League football battle at North Haven's Center Memorial Field.

Fullback Nate Menchetti sparked the winners with two touchdowns, scoring from eight yards out in the opening quarter and circling and for the tie-breaking counter in the third. Quarterback Dave Gould fired to fullback John Roche for the other third period tally, and connected with Paul Aston on a 23-yard scoring aerial in the fourth. Gould has completed 62 passes in 125 attempts this season for 1,063 yards.

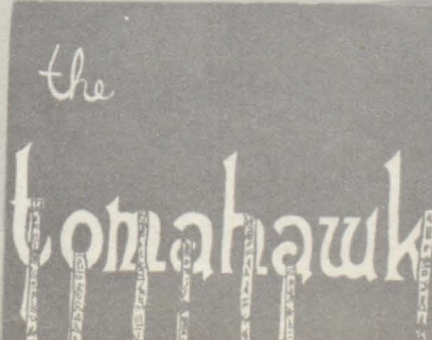

Indians Ambush East Haven 20-18

Memorial Field Proves To Be 'Burial Ground'

Center Memorial Field in North Haven, site of North Haven High School's home football games, is supposed to be abandoned by the Indians next season in favor of a newly seeded gridiron behind the school. But the place will still live rather vividly in the minds of the Indians' Hoosatic League rivals. They'll remember it as the graveyard of potential champions.

Yesterday morning, before a Veterans' Day crowd of approximately 1,000, Tim Cornell's unheralded Indians played the role of spoiler again by taking from a 12th first-quarter deficit for a stirring 20-18 triumph over second place East Haven that just about removed the Eagles from the title running. And it was on the same soil, almost exactly a month before, that the Indians had knocked Branford from among the undefeated in a 32-30 ambush.

The decisive touchdown in yesterday's game — which dropped East Haven from second to third and left shambles the undisputed leader by a half-game over Branford — came on an 18-yard pass from quarterback Dave Gould to halfback Arthur Bodwell with just five minutes remaining. East Haven gained two more scoring chances after that, but Mike Menchetti recovered a half-point loss from Yellowjacket Jim Salvati on the Tribe 22 with four minutes to go, and on the final play the Eagles' Vin Virgilio was pulled down at the 12 on an unsuccessful attempt to penetrate the Indians' tight side.

Offensive failure in the game was divided between Menchetti, a fighting fullback who gained 80 yards in 13 rushes and placekicked both the extra points, and Gould, who completed six of 15 passes for 180 yards and made two of them his sixth and 30 touchdown passes of the year. His first of the morning was a 26-yard throw on the opening play of the second period, which right end Mike Meloy accepted on the Eastie 45 and carried the rest of the way on a 77-yard play that tally, with Menchetti's conversion, brought the Indians from virtual oblivion and cut the Eastie edge to only 2-7.

Kicker Start East
East Haven started out to make a romp of it, scored twice in the opening session while North Haven was making only 13 yards. But Veterans' made the first TD on a 78-yard jump pass from quarterback back to receiver after getting 5-0

and a fumble recovery on the 10 and Salvati carried around right end for the second after Vets had picked up a hobnob at Indian 12 on the preceding play. Veterans' gradually made good placement after the second 'Jaw' (menchetti) but an offside ruling cost the Eagles five yards and the point; and a pass by Letis from the 7 was bottled down. Veterans' now after the previous TD had been blocked, and in the third stanza, after the Eagles had captured the lead at 12-15, Vets kicked low and wide.

Gould Passes Kick
Gould's scoring piler to Meloy came on the second play after the ensuing kickoff, which Nate Qualls had returned to the Indian 23. Midway through the period the Redskins struck again, going 48 yards in five plays with Menchetti harping over from the two after Gould had pegged to Johnny Roche for 22 to put it there. Menchetti's kick was blocked after a high pass from center but the Tribe went off with a 19-12 margin at the half, after a pause, third TD drive turned at the Eastie 18.

East Haven woke up after intermission and moved the kickoff 68 yards in 13 plays with the longest being a 22-yard strike from Letis to left end Brian Meloy. An 11-play drive then gave the Easties first down on the one and after the Indians heaved for ten plays Salvati carried over.

The Indians raced back to the Eastie 27, but ran out of down there when Menchetti was collared on fourth down a yard short of the first. Shortly afterwards, however, the Tribe 48 conversion again and began the winning push from their own 20. Glans of 16 and four yards by Menchetti moved them to the 49, and with a third down there Gould flipped to Roche, who took it in the left flat and raced 23 yards to the Eastie 18. From there Gould, from double-wing formation hit Bodwell with a toss over the middle at the nine, and Bodwell outraced Letis and Vin Virgilio to the right coffin corner for the score.

But it wasn't in the cards for East Haven to win. For the Indians came back and finally won 20-18 on a tremendous passing attack. "Something we had prepared for all week," said Frank.
"We knew they were going to pass. So we worked on it every day."

Indians Trip Branford, 62-57, For First Victory In Series

Branford High, upset victor over powerful East Haven last Friday night, moved into North Haven last night and was ambushed by the Indians for the first time in the schools' brief Housatonic League series, 62-57.

The Indians, sparked by the fast breaking of co-captain Johnny Roche and the rebounding of Al Hadley, tallied nine straight points at the beginning of the second half to erase a Branford lead, then put down a last-minute Hornet rally to secure their fifth victory in ten decisions. The loss was Branford's third against two wins.

The first half was fairly even, with North Haven enjoying a brief lead only to have Branford tie it 12-12 at the quarter and go one up, 21-20, at the half. In the third quarter, however, the Indians built up a 29-21 lead before the visitors knew what hit them, and the Tribe continued to lead going into the last quarter, 48-35. The Hornets, led by center Pete Dzwonkoski, put on a determined rally to pull within a bucket, 57-55, with two minutes left in the game, but Don Shuster increased the North Haven margin to three points with a foul shot. Hadley put in a rebound, and Hank Sargent followed with a lay-up to put the game on ice.

The story of the game is found in the team shooting. North Haven hit for 54.8 per cent of its shots from the floor.

Indians Subdue Seymour High as Dave Gould Shines

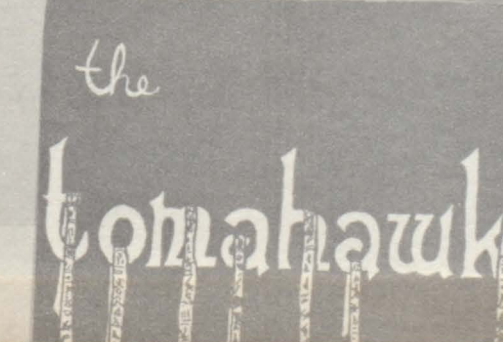
