

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education is a group which sets up the educational policies of the town. The job of setting up the town's first high school was an important task. They have completed most of this work and have done an excellent job. These people seem to be in the background, but they are the backbone of the educational system.



SUPERINTENDENT

Mr. Charles T. St. Clair was appointed superintendent of schools in July, 1954. He served as high school principal for three years. Before coming to North Haven Mr. St. Clair taught English, French, and science in three New York State high schools, Conifer, Spencer Port and Middletown. While at Middletown High School, he also served as administrative assistant. We are fortunate to have a man with such a fine record as superintendent.



PRINCIPAL

Mr. Thomas A. Aquila was appointed as principal of North Haven High School in July, 1954. Prior to this time, Mr. Aquila served respectively as teacher, counselor, and vice principal. He has made many fine innovations to the staff, student body, and program of studies.

Mr. Redfield became assistant principal in July of 1954. Previous to this appointment, Mr. Redfield served as principal of the Montowese school. He is making many fine contributions to North Haven High School.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Building Committee is a branch of the town government which presides over the building of schools. During the past eight years, two new schools and two additions have been completed. In 1948, the Ridge Road School was completed; in 1951 the Junior High School wing, and in 1953 the Senior High School wing were completed. Additions to Center School and Ridge Road School were completed this year. Already ground has been broken for another elementary school. This group of citizens is to be commended for a job well done.



DEWITT CLINTON ALLEN

D. C. Allen was the first North Haven superintendent of schools. He served from February 1910 to September 1937, after being appointed by the State Board of Education. During his superintendency, he centralized the educational facilities from seven buildings to three. He has performed invaluable services for the educational development of the town.


PEP CLUB


VARSITY CHEERLEADERS







Our thanks to Mr. Connell for his excellent job in developing a successful J.V. basketball team with determined players.



The North Haven Play Day tournament was held and the club competed against other school in the area.


This year an award and recognition program was introduced for the members of the club.


SPRING MUSIC FESTIVAL





Marilyn Sherman has been promoted to the office of efficiency expert in the office at N.H.H.S. Working under her is Myra Worzek.


